



And our parking expansion and enhanced entry will reframe the entire guest experience.

#### A New Visitor Services Center


A \$5 million investment will create a new arrival experience, one that's not simply convenient and efficient but inspirational as well. Guests will leave the outside world behind and step into nature via a grand Visitor Services Center connected to the White River Gardens. They'll set their own pace, proceeding through landscaped archways, past fountains and playful sculptures on their way to the Zoo animals they know and love. The entirely reimagined entry experience will be visitor-friendly and wrapped in nature: a welcoming threshold for our Zoo

The White River Gardens will become a place of wonder and discovery — where guests might meet a chatty parrot or a sleepy sloth. Our Wild Encounter animal ambassadors will be a delightful surprise and a learning opportunity for guests of all ages.







# Creating Connections

After a stroll through the White River Gardens, guests will enter a dynamic indoor environment, the Global Center for Species Survival.

Within the Global Center, more than one million visitors per year will experience our living planet from a new perspective. Designed to showcase the diversity of life on earth and the critical work of conservation scientists, this sensory adventure will make conservation science exciting and accessible for guests of all ages.

As guests enter the new Global Center for Species Survival, they will be invited to learn more about protecting our world and saving species. Conservation experts will discuss breaking news in conservation and encourage questions. From a practical standpoint, the Global Center's wide hallway and graded ramps will accommodate high-volume and low-volume visitation patterns, allowing for an improved guest experience.

The Global Center will advance the mission of the Indianapolis Zoo — to protect nature and inspire people to care for our world. It will influence attitudes and inspire guests of all ages to save species. In short, the Global Center will create a conservation-literate populace with multi-generational implications for our planet.



# Saving Species

At the core of the Global Center, a groundbreaking international Headquarters will be on display. A dedicated team will serve a global network of more than 10,000 science-based experts in full view of Zoo visitors.


The Global Center for Species Survival Headquarters represents an incredible partnership between the Indianapolis Zoo — an expert in public education and fundraising, and the International Union for Conservation of Nature Species Survival Commission — a global authority with wide-reaching capacity for species-saving policy and action. The goal of this collaboration is clear: to conserve the integrity and diversity of nature.

A \$5 million investment will establish the global Headquarters office and operations team of conservation experts from around the world with a clear purpose: to help save animals, plants and fungi at risk of extinction and stop the irreversible collapse of ecosystems. In addition to creating a permanent Headquarters, our Zoo will also leverage this opportunity to make conservation science relatable, entertaining, and actionable for all.

What will this mean for our Zoo and our community? The Global Center for Species Survival Headquarters will solidify our international reputation as a hub for species conservation efforts. The Zoo will host international meetings and conferences, furthering our ability for involvement with a wide scale of biodiversity projects. And, we will expand economic benefit to the community and our ability to connect science and scientists with the

#### **IUCN:** A Powerful Ally for Our Planet

The partnership between the Indianapolis Zoo and the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Species Survival Commission (SSC) to create the Global Center for Species Survival is the first of its kind, representing an unprecedented alliance between the network of accredited zoos and the world's oldest and largest conservation organization. The International Union for Conservation of Nature is the global authority on the preservation of the natural world.

The Species Survival Commission — an international network of 10,000 scientists — assess the status of plant and animal species around the world, plan for their conservation, and act to make those plans a reality.

## **Species Under Threat**



The loss of diversity of life on earth in recent history is staggering, and the pace is accelerating. The IUCN Red List, the world's most comprehensive information source on the global conservation status of animal, fungi and plant species, reports that there are currently more than 120,000 species whose populations are threatened – with 32,000 species facing extinction.





This has laid the groundwork for the Zoo's next step: the Global Center for Species Survival.



# Discovering Chimpanzees

The International Chimpanzee Complex will span a large portion of the Zoo's campus and provide an enriching, functional forest for approximately 30 chimpanzees. This innovative exhibit will recreate important aspects of chimpanzees' natural habitat, allowing chimpanzees to thrive.

Chimpanzees have distinct cultures and emotionally rich relationships. Much like human beings, chimpanzees are highly social animals who live in societies with complex norms and behaviors. Witnessing these similarities can serve as both a reminder of our own connection to the natural world and a call to provide stewardship to a kindred species that is threatened with extinction.

The Indianapolis Zoo is now home to two males and three female chimpanzees. They currently live in a private area of the Zoo until the International Chimpanzee Complex is completed. 


#### **Chimpanzees Will Make Choices**

The International Chimpanzee Complex will provide an environment where chimpanzees can make decisions about where they go, what they do and with whom they interact. Chimpanzees typically live in a community of twenty to fifty individuals from both sexes and all ages. Organized around a strict social hierarchy, wild chimpanzees spend their days foraging for food, jostling for power and influence, and strengthening their bonds with other chimpanzees through grooming and playing.

A "fusion-fission society" describes the chimpanzee social system. Throughout the course of the day, they will split up (fission) and come back together (fusion). A spectacular fusion space for the apes is envisioned near the existing front entrance. This complex and dynamic area will provide the chimpanzees with elevated spaces that allow a view of downtown Indianapolis and White River State Park.







#### **Creating Personal Connections with Chimpanzees**

The International Chimpanzee Complex is poised to become one of the most popular experiences at the Indianapolis Zoo. Guests will discover these great apes in an environment that respects their natural needs, social structures, and behaviors. Generations of Zoo patrons will grow up with close, personal ties to chimpanzees, forming an affinity for these magnificent animals that will last a lifetime.

The International Chimpanzee Complex will attract attention from regional colleges and universities interested in observational research. Scientists will study and learn from the chimpanzees at our Zoo in an environment which replicates nature as closely as possible.

Moreover, the International Chimpanzee Complex will help build an informed constituency for the protection of wild chimpanzees. It is our goal to revolutionize attitudes and perceptions, leading to greater appreciation for chimpanzees in all contexts.








#### **Chimpanzee Tool Use and Ingenuity**

Chimpanzees utilize memory, insight, social learning and problem-solving skills in many aspects of their behavior. One important example is the way chimpanzees make and use tools. Chimpanzees employ 21 modes of tool use, such as cracking nuts open with stones, using large banana tree leaves as umbrellas, extracting termites with sticks and even hunting prey animals with spears.

Within the new Complex, they will enjoy the freedom to visit the tool use space at their own leisure, similar to the ways in which wild chimpanzees explore and move about their home-ranges in African forests. By emphasizing chimpanzees' ingenuity and creativity through spontaneous and demonstrated tool use, guests will have powerful impressions of what chimpanzees are really like and the critical need to secure their future in the wild.



#### **Chimpanzee Behavior and Cognition**

At the Cognition Center within the International Chimpanzee Complex, chimpanzees will engage in cognitive tasks through computerized touch panel stations designed by scientists to study how they think and perceive the world. Visitors to the Cognition Center will observe this effort and be given opportunities to complete the same cognitive tasks as the chimpanzees, thereby forging intellectual connections between humans and apes. The tasks are designed to stimulate the chimpanzees' mental abilities and automatically reward them with food based on their performance. By placing computerized touch panel stations at the Cognition Center and around the expansive network of buildings and yards, our chimpanzees will have incentive to "forage" by travelling between the stations and to display fusion fission social dynamics.

The Cognition Center will serve as the central location for a variety of chimpanzee research and enrichment efforts. Visitors will gain exposure to cutting-edge cognitive research and will learn about the ways in which they can help to protect wild chimpanzees. Much like the Simon Skjodt International Orangutan Center, the International Chimpanzee Complex expects to publish important chimpanzee research based on work here at the Indianapolis Zoo. This research will contribute to our collective understanding of chimpanzees and, by comparison, other great apes.



## A Functional Forest, Spanning the Zoo

To achieve both unparalleled animal welfare and guest experience, the concept of the International Chimpanzee Complex includes redrawing the perimeter of the Zoo, expanding it dramatically and allowing chimpanzees to travel through the Zoo and experience a fusion-fission society. Individual chimpanzees can come and go among different social groups, which may change from moment-to-moment or day-to-day.

Our design involves multiple indoor and outdoor destinations for the apes spread out over hundreds of meters around the Zoo. Our community of chimpanzees will have a vast environment with multiple outdoor yards and buildings. They will have free range over their entire territory. Every destination will be connected by a series of elevated trails viewable by the public, enabling the chimpanzees to travel freely among spaces, choosing where and with whom they will spend their time. Their outdoor yards will feature structures with ample vertical space and climbing opportunities that offer views of the Zoo, White River and downtown Indianapolis. Perfect areas for them to spend time with their friends.

- **Community Hub** will offer guests glimpses of chimpanzees at the Zoo, first as they enter the Visitor Services Center and again when they exit the Global Center for Species Survival.
- 2 Chimpanzee Trail will create enclosed pathways and enable chimpanzees to travel, either alone or in groups; giving the apes an opportunity to relax, socialize, groom and take breaks. Guests will see chimpanzees along their daily journeys.
- 3 **Cognition Center** will be a key destination for chimpanzees and Zoo guests. Much like wild chimpanzees in African forests, the apes will explore and choose their companions and activities, exercising their cognitive abilities in the process.
- Chimpanzee Culture Center will provide multiple indoor spaces for chimpanzees to gather in small groups. Visitor spaces within this building will also be indoors, creating a comfortable break from the elements.







# Expanding Our Reach

In a typical campaign, parking lots aren't inspiring.
This isn't a typical campaign or a typical parking project.
For our Zoo, parking acquisition and development is a linchpin to what's possible for our future.





Our master plan includes a complete reimagining of the entry experience — which will repurpose a large portion of the current parking lot. Expanding our footprint into the current parking lot and moving a fraction of the parking spaces off-site allows us to utilize the freed space on our main campus for expanded exhibits and enhanced experiences. In 2019, the Indianapolis Zoo acquired 26.5 acres of land south of West Washington Street on the site of the former GM Stamping Plant. This includes a parcel that is zoned for commercial parking and storage.

As we move into the construction phase of the master plan, it will be necessary to ensure a comfortable visit for guests from the moment they arrive. A portion of this lot is slated for development of 1,000 permanent parking spaces with a paved surface, permanent lighting, landscaping, and appropriate guest services. In the near term, this new "South Lot" will expand our total visitor capacity.

A \$7 million investment in parking acquisition and development will not only enhance our sustainability, it will help us expand our core offering and our reach.

# Financials

To inform investments and anticipate potential outcomes of the campaign, the Indianapolis Zoo engaged independent consultants to conduct feasibility and economic impact studies\*. The resulting campaign plan builds on the Zoo's accomplishments and expertise and will include bold new initiatives, rich and expansive animal habitats, and transformative visitor experiences.





Prior to the new master plan (2014-2020), the Indianapolis Zoo had a \$50 million annual economic impact on the Indianapolis Metropolitan Statistical Area. That is expected to jump to a \$60 million annual impact post-plan (2021-2029) — a 20% increase.

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
